there will be a Funday and Information hub in the park so you can see what is being suggested following the online 'conversation' and have your say




In the coming months we hope to developed a prioritised list of actions and project proposals to be taken towards the detailed design stage












What are the negative aspects of the space?


96 % of respondents wanted to see investment in the space - but what improvements mattered most?



What infrastructure improvements do you think would work well in the space?







A number of projects were suggested and people were asked to rank the ideas from great idea to bad idea.

A series of design objectives were suggested and people asked if they agreed or disagreed. This is the response.

The project should make Coalie Park functional as a park for a wide range of users	89%	8%	3%
The project brings together the existing spaces scattered throughout this linear 'park' by giving them functions as a series of 'hubs'	70%	25%	5%
The project should promote and encourage active travel by waymarking and improving the loop route	83%	13%	4%
The project should regain a connection with the river setting by re-establishing view corridors and visual connections	89%	9%	2%
The project should bring the vegetation into active, positive management for biodiversity, and for a sense of safety and placemaking	94%	5%	1%

Around 70% of those who took part made further comments, many of which focused on:

- Access conflict.
- Uneven surfaces,
- Space for Wildlife,
- Bins,
- Benches,
- Antisocial Behaviour,
- Maintenance,
- The Car Park,
- Lighting,
- Event space,
- Access to the river.



We also had great suggestions including:

Outdoor play, sport and active travel improvements which do not mean the usual playparks, skateparks or exercise machines

Plan improvement which works day and night for users and local residents

Connections to other greenspaces Sandport Place, Keddie Park, The Quilts, North Leith Burial Ground – what is the true scope of the project

How to improve the Under the Bridge and Brick structures

Water Fountain

Bike Racks

Create a 'Friends of Group'

Over all there was one very strong message to keep the space wild, with habitats for wildlife and retain a sense of peace and tranquillity by the Water of Leith
