Pupils learn about the Jacobite rebellion, with a particular focus upon September 1745 when Bonnie Prince Charlie stayed at Gray's Mill and his men gathered in the Craiglockhart Dells. This programme is most suitable for classes who are doing a project on the Jacobites as it extends the learning in class to the outdoors where pupils engage in drama activities to experience a life of a soldier.

Curriculum Links

On the Day

Pupils engage in classroom activities to find out more about life in 1745 before going out into the Craiglockhart Dells to become soldiers. They look for edible plants, build a shelter to sleep in, and lay a trail for the rest of the class to follow. They also re-enact the Battle of Culloden. In the afternoon, the pupils engage in a Jacobite-themed art project to take back to school.

All adults and children should come dressed for the weather in comfortable outdoor clothing with sturdy footwear that they don't mind getting muddy.
